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IAS syllabus is the fundamental and indispensable component of IAS preparation. The candidates must understand that they need to prepare each and every topic given in the IAS syllabus given in the official notification. Moreover, the candidates should also prepare the inter-relation of the topics and the inter-dependence of the topics of the IAS syllabus. The UPSC questions always ask the inner-disciplinary concepts. More elaborately, we can say that the IAS main exam asks various questions having their orientation in real-world scenarios. But relevancy to the exam is the only lens which can filter the current events of national and international importance and restrict the horizontal expansion only. There is no limit to the vertical expansion of a topic. One must think what is the horizontal expansion and vertical expansion of the topic? By horizontal expansion we mean the number of topics which can be considered relevant for the exam and vertical expansion means the details about the topic. The UPSC can ask about any aspect of the topics hence there is no limit to the vertical expansion of the IAS syllabus topics. IAS syllabus can be said to be the agglomeration of important topics relevant from the Commission's point of view. IAS exam syllabus is different for each stage of the exam, though the IAS mentors suggest the integrated approach for the exam to cover all three stages, all of them suggest concentrating on the IAS prelims exam in the last two months to learn and revise the facts. This differentiates the IAS syllabus for prelims and mains. The candidates should analyse the previous years' papers of the IAS exam to know the real demand for the exam. The candidates should try to read between the lines to know the message conveyed directly or indirectly from the words written in the IAS syllabus. Table of Contents IAS syllabus is defined in the official notification for the two stages of the Civil Service Exam. There is no defined syllabus for the IAS personality test. UPSC has outlined a very broad idea about the IAS personality test. IAS exam syllabus though explained for the main exam but most of the questions in the main exam are the result of intertwined concepts. So the candidates should also cover the dynamics between the topics given in the IAS syllabus.
